From our Pastor . . .

Transitions

Every June I am reminded of how our lives unfold as one transition after an other. Our high school seniors are in transition to high school graduates and college graduates are transitioning to work or additional study. Fifth graders are starting the transition to middle school (that's a big one, especially for their parents), eighth graders to high school, and four year olds are in transition to kindergarten. With the May 24th ordinations and installations, our Session is in transition as a new Session forms. Several of our families in the church have recently moved or are in the midst of moving (one of the worst transitions of all). Our seminary interns are graduating or moving on to other places of study and preparation. Some of our older members are in transition from their homes to assisted living facilities. Transitions – where do they stop!?

We never stop making transitions, of course, until we make that one final, terminal transition. The rock band The Byrd's version of Ecclesiastes' old words ring so true: for every season...turn, turn, turn.

Since transitions are part of our lives, we have no choice but to face them, learn from them, and move on past them.

In the gospel of Matthew, Jesus' final words to his disciples include the promise, "I will be with you always, even to the end of the age." And in the gospel of John, Jesus says, "I will send a comforter, the Holy Spirit, who will teach us all things." With these words of comfort, we also find the wisdom and strength to lift us up through even difficult transitions.

Now, as many of you "transition" into vacation mode, take care! God is with you and will be with you always.

RISC Continues to Make Progress On Important Social Issues



On April 20, RISC (Richmonders Involved To Strengthen Our Communities) held its annual Nehemiah Action at Good Shepherd Baptist Church on Church Hill and aggressively pursued commitments from public official on important social issues. To say that the meeting was successful is an understatement – over 1000 people, including a strong turnout of BAPC members, enthusiastically showed their support for the goals of RISC at this well orchestrated event. The gathering also received positive coverage in the City's daily newspaper and other weekly periodicals.

At the meeting, Richmond Mayor Dwight Jones promised to consider funding in the City's upcoming budget for a proposed drug program for inmates at the City jail. The new program supported by RISC would cost \$140,000 for the treatment of 120 inmates per year and would pay for itself if only seven inmates did not become recidivists after release from jail and completion of the proposed program.

RISC also sought a commitment from Ms. Sheryl Garland, Vice President of Community Outreach for the VCU Health System, regarding its health care program for the indigent and uninsured. Ms. Garland agreed to work with RISC to make improvements in the provision of direct health care in its Virginia Coordinated Care Program for the medically uninsured.

Many RISC members later attended a public hearing held by the Richmond City Council on May 4 for the City's proposed 2010 budget. Their goal was to convince the Council to include funding in next year's budget for the proposed drug program that Mayor Jones had promised to consider. Council members listened attentively as RISC officers made their presentation.

Pursuit of social justice on these important issues is not easy but RISC clearly is making progress! Please consider joining in this effort and/or supporting it financially.

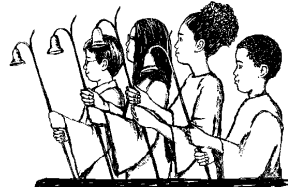


Fairly Traded Chocolate

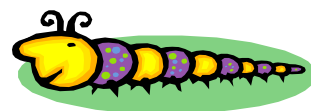

The Rotations for the month of June is Gifts of the Spirit. The memory verse is 1 Corinthians 12:5-6, "*There are different ways to serve the same LORD, and we can each do different things. Yet the same God works in all of us and helps us in everything we do.*"

One thing that we all have is a gift from God. The Apostle Paul speaks to these gifts in his first letter to the church in Corinth. 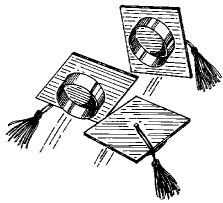

THE BAPC SESSION REPORTS

At its regularly scheduled meeting on Sunday, May 3, 2009 the Session:

- Approved Isabel McCormack as an Affiliate Member from South Highland Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, AL. Her sponsor is Sara Unetic. Her son is member Ted McCormack.
- Approved the examinations for Elder of Mark Stevens, Rob Tombes, Bubba Britton, Ted McCormack, David Huffine, and Linda Johnston. (Gisela Stech is visiting family in Europe and was approved at the previous Session meeting).
- Approved the ordination and installation of Elders-Elect Stevens, Britton, and Johnston on May 24, 2009, and to install Elders Tombes, McCormack, and Huffine, the same day.
- Heard a report from the Staff Relations Division on Associate Minister Smith’s progress to date in his various duties and relationships developed within the congregation and in the larger church. Associate Pastor Smith offered comments on his planned future emphasis and development. A copy of Associate Pastor Smith’s 2009 goals was provided for review.
- Heard that the April Treasurer’s Report showed the pledge receipts were 5% below budget at this time, however, this is improved over the same time last year.
- Heard that the wiring for lighting of the new church sign is in progress. Some rework of the informational wording on the sign is being done to improve readability.
- Heard that the RISC event held in April had about 1,000 attendees.
- Heard that the Gateway Home project by BAPC to collect apartment furnishings for a female tenant is underway.
- Heard that the Worship Division is evaluating ways to improve the older hymnals in the Sanctuary that have worn out over time.
- Heard that the Worship Division will gather congregational input on whether Bibles should be available at the Sanctuary seats similar to availability of hymnals.
- Heard that Christian Education Division is recruiting teachers for the fall.
- Approved George Comstock to serve on the Endowment Fund Committee for a term of May 2009, to September 2012.
- Heard a report by the Jimmy Winters Committee on whether the potential sale of the residence at the corner of Jimmy Winters and W. Huguenot Roads, adjacent the church’s property is of interest. The committee’s report indicated the church’s needs were in improving its current facilities and not in procuring additional property. It was approved to receive the report and record it.
- Approved a preschool request to sell note cards with preschool children’s art to the congregation and others. All profits would go to the Kathryn Cardwell Preschool Scholarship Fund.
- Approved a preschool request to sell the old chairs that were formerly used in the preschool and other old chairs in storage to help purchase the additional chairs that are needed to go with the recently purchased tables.
